Overview

The Southwest Division remains active in administration, membership engagement, veteran service, community outreach, ceremonial support, youth programs, and Scouting. The combined reports submitted by Arizona, California, Aloha Detachment 363 in Hawaii, and Nevada reflect continued commitment to Marines, FMF Corpsmen, veterans, families, and local communities.

Selected Division Results

Arizona reported 21 active detachments and complete ROI compliance. California obtained approximately 95% of ROIs and continued work toward two new Southern California detachments. Aloha Detachment 363 reported 1,000 VSO hours and 15 funeral or burial services. Nevada reported 4,466 community-service hours and a Toys for Tots campaign serving 32,896 children.

Department of Arizona

- Following its Department Convention, Arizona seated a new Board of Trustees and Department staff, with elected and appointed positions fully staffed.
- The Department reported 21 active detachments. All active detachments submitted complete Reports of Officer Installation and remained in good standing with National reporting requirements.
- The suspension of White Tank Mountain Detachment #1246 was lifted, contingent upon timely elections and officer installation, submission of a current ROI, mandatory Department training participation through calendar year 2027, and continued compliance with Department and National Administrative Procedures.
- Three detachments maintained active Color Guards: Tucson Detachment #7, Ira Hayes Detachment #2, and San Francisco Peaks Detachment #912.
- The proposed FY 2027 budget emphasized fiscal responsibility, operational readiness, communications and website technology, Department training, detachment support, conferences, member services, and long-term sustainability.
- Arizona identified improved communication, leadership development, membership growth and retention, and continued administrative compliance as ongoing priorities.

Department of California

- California remained in good standing with the Internal Revenue Service, with required filings current and no reported change in legal or organizational standing.
- The Department continued to maintain active detachments statewide and was working to charter two additional detachments in Southern California.
- Administrative improvements included Zelle for Paymaster transactions, a revised budget addressing inflation and increased costs, an audit that obtained approximately 95% of ROIs, proposed bylaw revisions, a proposed Department Compliance Officer, and appointment of a Public Relations Officer.
- Department leadership visited and installed officers at multiple detachments. Monterey Bay Detachment 711 reported that it had not received a Department Commandant visit in approximately 30 years.
- California was represented at the MCL Mid-Winter Conference, Southwest Division Conference, Nevada and Arizona Department Conventions, and four Marine Corps Birthday celebrations.
- Veteran and community outreach included resource fairs, women-veteran events, Color and Honor Guard support, VA disability-rating guidance, assistance to widowed spouses, VSO recruitment, Yellow Ribbon events, Toys for

Tots support, holiday distributions through the Hollenbeck Youth Center, and coordination with the Young Marines program.

Aloha Detachment 363 - Hawaii

Members in Action report covering January 1 through June 30, 2026; submitted by Carl A. Vincenti, Commandant.

- Members attended 15 funeral and burial services, reporting 110 service hours, and conducted seven command visits supporting Marine Corps Base Hawaii units, Schofield Barracks, Pearl Harbor-Hickam, Marines, Corpsmen, and active-duty personnel, reporting 34 hours.
- Four veterans-benefits educational classes reached 80 veterans, active-duty personnel, and spouses. The report lists 64 class-related hours, 82 preparation and travel hours, and 378 miles.
- Youth drug-awareness and leadership activities accounted for 200 member hours and 900 miles. Ceremonial participation at Barbers Point, Pearl Harbor, Punchbowl, Kaneohe Veterans Cemetery, and a Gold Star cemetery visit accounted for 60 member hours.
- The detachment reported zero Eagle Scout certificates during the period and 42 JROTC physical-fitness certificates. Celebration parades involved eight participants, 20 hours, and 30 miles.
- Additional service included two veteran wellness visits; collection of 300 pounds of disaster-relief food; Toys for Tots and local-child planning; placement of six separating service members into community jobs and one additional member job placement; and 1,000 VSO hours, with \$300 expended.
- Members provided approximately 55 hours of veterans-benefits instruction to Wayland Baptist University students, coordinated the donation of 12 children's bicycles and personally donated two bicycles valued at approximately \$280, and dedicated approximately 362 hours to outreach and sock collection for veterans experiencing homelessness.

Department of Nevada

- Nevada performed 14 funeral honors and reported 4,466 community-service hours.
- Toys for Tots efforts served 32,896 children, collected 37,006 toys, and raised approximately \$60,000. The High Desert Detachment campaign was recognized as a Chamber of Commerce Non-Profit finalist for the second consecutive year.
- The Department assisted 16 transitioning Marines and their families and supported Memorial Day, Fourth of July, Veterans Day, and Eagle Scout activities.
- Greater Nevada Detachment's charity golf tournament included 14 sponsors, 51 players, and 16 volunteers.
- For the 250th Marine Corps Birthday, celebrations were held in three locations, including a flag raising at the Nevada State Capitol. The Las Vegas Birthday Ball sold out within 40 hours and drew more than 1,200 attendees.
- Three Department members completed 135 hours of accredited VSO training and assisted 119 veterans and family members with claims and benefit filings. Nevada also formed a committee to prepare for the 2027 convention.

Division outlook: Priorities for the coming year are consistent reporting, improved communication, leadership development, shared VSO and outreach practices, membership growth, and stronger youth and Scouting coordination.

Ex-Officio Report - National Scout Committee

The complete National Scout Committee report is intended to be attached to this annual report. The following text summarizes the principal information for the National Commandant and Board of Trustees.

Mission and Committee

The National Scout Committee advances the Marine Corps League mission by fostering Americanism and patriotic volunteerism across generations. It works with Divisions, Departments, and Detachments to recognize youth who earn Scouting's highest awards, recognize qualified League members through the Scouting America Community Organization Square Knot Award, recommend deserving youth for the Hero Medal, and connect Scouting units with service projects supporting veterans.

The 2026 committee consisted of Joe Uribe, Ex-Officio; Bill Kropa, Chair; Rich Walsh, Vice Chair; and members Dave Masunas, Charles Minton, and Steve Bosshard. Committee inquiries may be directed to scouting@mcleague.org.

2026 Results

- A total of 1,674 Good Citizenship Certificates were reported nationally. The Central Division led with 405 certificates, and the Department of Pennsylvania led all Departments with 213.
- The Southwest Division reported 92 certificates: California 88 and Arizona 4. Hawaii, Nevada, Okinawa, and Guam reported zero in the national count.
- The Good Citizenship program recognizes Eagle Scouts, Venturing Summit Award recipients, and Sea Scout Quartermasters. The MCL Auxiliary, when available, recognizes Girl Scouts who earn the Gold Award.

Committee Initiatives

- The committee expanded social-media outreach through major Scouting volunteer groups and direct links to the National MCL webpage.
- An annual newsletter was established to highlight Detachment successes, provide program updates, and answer frequently asked questions.
- A national contact database was developed from National through Detachment level to improve response to support requests from across the country and abroad.
- The committee continued hands-on support to help Detachments establish and sustain local programs appropriate to their capacity.

Community Organization Square Knot Award

The MCL has participated in Scouting America's Community Service Award program since 2020. The award is available to regular and associate members in good standing who are registered adult Scouting leaders and receive approval from both the National Scout Committee and Scouting America. The square knot includes an Eagle, Globe, and Anchor device.

- Claude Jay Rutan of Northampton County Detachment #298, Department of Pennsylvania, was approved on July 16, 2026.
- Stuart Blair of Baltimore Detachment #565, Department of Maryland, was approved on July 16, 2026.
- These presentations brought the cumulative number of approved recipients to 11.

National Engagement and Leadership Support

Chair Bill Kropa's participation in the Scouting America National Annual Meeting and National Scout Jamboree provides both high-level institutional engagement and direct field outreach. The Annual Meeting supports relationships with national executives, commissioners, and council professionals and helps align MCL programs with national Scouting policy. The Jamboree provides direct visibility before more than 15,000 youth and thousands of adult volunteers at the Summit Bechtel Reserve, including America 250 programming.

- Division, Department, and Detachment Commandants are requested to appoint dedicated Scout Coordinators and forward current contact information through the chain of command.
- All levels are encouraged to place Scouting program resources and coordinator contact information prominently on their websites.
- Complete and timely reporting is essential because current national data does not capture all work being performed locally.
- The committee encourages recognition of any person who has earned the rank of Eagle Scout, whether recently or decades ago, because recognition builds goodwill, increases MCL visibility, and supports recruitment.

Southwest Division Priorities

The immediate Southwest Division priorities are to sustain California's strong certificate activity, increase participation in Arizona, establish or confirm active Department Scout Coordinators in Hawaii and Nevada, improve reporting, and expand awareness in Guam and Okinawa. The full attached committee report contains detailed program guidance, reporting dates, presentation recommendations, frequently asked questions, the newsletter, national counts, and contact information.

1. Purpose of the Committee

The mission of the National Scout Committee (NSC) is to advance the Marine Corps League's (MCL) overarching goals by fostering Americanism and patriotic volunteerism



across generations. We achieve this by collaborating with Divisions, Departments, and Detachments to:

- Recognize America's youth who have achieved the highest ranks in Scouting.
- Honor regular and associate members who qualify for the Scouting America Community Organization Square Knot Award.
- Recommend deserving youth for the Hero Medal.
- Partner with local Scouting units to identify meaningful community service projects that support our Veterans.

2. 2025 Good Citizenship Certificates

Our primary operational focus remains presenting Good Citizenship Certificates to deserving youth. As of this report, we have proudly presented 1,674 certificates this year.

Special congratulations go out to the Central Division (405 certificates) and the Department of Pennsylvania (213 certificates) for leading the nation in presentations.

3. NSC Initiatives

A. Social Media Outreach

We continue to aggressively expand awareness of the Good Citizenship Certificate program nationwide. The NSC maintains an active presence on prominent digital platforms, including the *Scouts BSA Female Troops Volunteers* and *Boy Scout Volunteers* Facebook groups. By sharing program information and direct links to the National MCL web page, we have generated substantial engagement and inquiries. Facebook remains a highly effective tool for identifying local Scout districts and troops to expand our reach.

B. NSC Newsletter

To bridge communication gaps, the NSC established an annual newsletter distributed to Scout Coordinators at all levels. This publication highlights Detachment successes, provides program updates, and addresses frequently asked questions.

C. National Contact Database

Inter-organizational communication remains one of our primary hurdles. The NSC frequently receives event support requests from across the country—and occasionally from abroad—making it time-consuming to identify the appropriate local point of contact. To streamline this process, the NSC developed a comprehensive contact list spanning National, Division, Department, and Detachment levels.

D. Detachment Support

The NSC continues to provide hands-on guidance to Detachments nationwide, helping them build and sustain localized Scouting programs that fit their operational capacity.

4. Community Service Award Program

In early 2020, the Board of Trustees approved the MCL's participation in Scouting America's Community Service Award program. This prestigious square knot is worn on the Scouting uniform and features an Eagle, Globe, and Anchor device to denote our organization.

It is available to MCL members and associates in good standing who are also registered adult leaders within Scouting America Councils, Districts, or units, subject to approval by both the NSC and Scouting America. Detailed criteria are available on the National webpage.

With these new presentations, there have been **11 recipients** to date. The primary objective of this initiative is to showcase the MCL within the broader community, demonstrating a unique avenue for Marine veterans to continue serving both our youth and our nation.



5. Maximizing Strategic Value Across Scouting's Premier National Events

The dual alignment of NSC Chair Bill Kropa attending both the Scouting America National Annual Meeting and the National Scout Jamboree creates a seamless loop of high-level policy influence and direct local execution for the MCL

The National Annual Meeting: Influencing Top-Tier Leadership

- Forging Institutional Alliances: By attending the annual meeting alongside Scouting America's national executive board, key commissioners, and council professionals, Bill cements the MCL's position as a vital national charter partner.
- Shaping Policy and Process: This is where national Scouting initiatives—like volunteer simplification, new onboarding pipelines, and unit retention tools—are rolled out. Bill's presence ensures that the MCL's Good Citizenship and Eagle Scout presentation programs remain perfectly aligned with new national Scouting standards.
- National Recognition: Positioning the MCL alongside top-tier national committees enhances the visibility of the MCL, encouraging more Scouts and Scouters to look to local detachments for leadership.



The National Jamboree: Mobilizing the Mission on the Ground

- Activating the Partnership: Moving from the boardroom to the field, Bill directly activates the Memorandum of Mutual Support before 15,000+ youth and thousands of adult volunteers at the Summit Bechtel Reserve.
- Frontline Outreach: The Jamboree provides a direct stage to showcase the shared values of the MCL and Scouting - leadership, discipline, and devotion to country -especially during this year's landmark America 250 patriotic celebrations.
- Direct Regional Connections: Bill can network face-to-face with regional council leaders and scoutmasters from all 50 states, opening immediate doors for local MCL detachments to establish steady, year-round Eagle Scout pipelines.



The Bottom Line for the MCL

Attending the National Annual Meeting allows the MCL to influence strategy and network at the top, while the National Jamboree allows the MCL to execute the mission and plant our flag on the ground. Together, these two events give Bill the ultimate blueprint and visibility to strengthen hometown youth programs across every local detachment.

6. Action Required: Call to Leadership Support

To overcome our ongoing communication and roster challenges, we need direct assistance from leadership at all levels.



- **Appoint and Elevate:** We request all Division, Department, and Detachment Commandants formally appoint a dedicated Scout Coordinator and forward their contact details up the chain of command.
- **Digital Visibility:** We request that all levels prominently feature Scouting program resources and coordinator contact information on their respective websites.

Our current data does not capture the full scope of the incredible work being done by quiet, hardworking Detachments across the country. Help us ensure every effort is counted.

7. Defining Our Impact

As a reminder, the Marine Corps operates on the timeless ethos, *"Once a Marine, Always a Marine."* Eagle Scouts share a parallel bond: *"Once an Eagle Scout, Always an Eagle Scout."*

While presentation traditions vary by Department, the NSC strongly encourages presenting the Good Citizenship Certificate to any individual who has earned the rank of Eagle Scout—whether they achieved it yesterday or decades ago. Recognizing this milestone builds tremendous goodwill, elevates the MCL's reputation, and serves as an exceptional tool for recruiting new members to our ranks.

The core pillars of Scouting—character development, citizenship training, and personal fitness—are vital to the success of future generations. It is our distinct responsibility as Marines and Associates to champion these values.

What do we do?

The mission of the National Scout Committee is to support the overall mission of the Marine Corps League, specifically in fostering the ideals of Americanism and patriotic volunteerism.

We do this by working with Divisions, Departments, and Detachments in recognizing America's youth who have earned the highest achievements in Scouting; recognizing regular and associate members who have met the requirements for the Scouting America Community Organization Square Knot Award; recommend deserving youth for the Hero Medal; and working with local Scouting units in identifying service projects to support Veterans.

The Community Organization Award is designed to recognize Marine Corps League members (including associate members) who are actively involved in the Scouting program and complete the requirements for the award. The award is meant to recognize the dedication and hard work required by League and Associate members to assist in furthering the Scouting program in the Marine Corps League. Members who earn this award can also be recognized by their Department / Detachment. Once approved, the League or Associate member is authorized to wear this Square Knot with an Eagle, Globe, and Anchor device.

Frequently Asked Questions

Q: What is a Good Citizenship Award?

A: It is an official certificate that is presented by the Marine Corps League to those in Scouting America (SA) who have achieved the rank of Eagle Scout, Summit Award, or Quartermaster Award. The Marine Corps League Auxiliary (if available) presents to those in the Girl Scouts of America who have achieved the Gold Award. If there is no local Auxiliary, the Detachment can modify a blank certificate to mirror the SA one.

Q: Why should your Department/Detachment participate in this program?

A: There are many reasons including; raising public awareness of the Marine Corps League within our communities, to congratulate and give recognition to Scouts who have achieved their highest awards, to reinforce to the Scout that the skills he or she has mastered are held in very high regard by the Marine Corps, the Marine Corps League, and corporations throughout the United States and around the world.

Q. How can participating in this program benefit our Department / Detachment?

A: There are many reasons including; Exposure in your community. (picture in the paper, guest at the ceremony, etc.), growing your network of volunteers, community support of your Department / Detachment programs and fundraisers, member recruitment possibilities, and getting more Department / Detachment members involved with functions.

Q. What does it cost?

A: This is a 100% voluntary program, but there is a cost. The certificate and red presentation folder from the MCL ship store sell for \$2.00 each. A pack of gold seals (for your Department stamp) from an office supply store is about \$6.00 per pack. Some Detachments present challenge coins, some present K-Bars, some even sponsor Scouts for summer camp or other high activities. It is up to you on how much you want to spend.

Marines Honor Michigan's Highest Scouting Achievers

Two members of the Marine Corps League's Department of Michigan Scouting Committee, Chair David Masunas of the Oceana County/Brett Witteveen Detachment #1225 and Rich Walsh of Kalamazoo Detachment #879, spent the 2026 recognition season traveling across the state to salute the young men and women who have reached the pinnacle of Scouting. At the Michigan Crossroads Council's annual regional recognition dinners on both sides of the state, the two Marines helped present more than 70 certificates to newly minted Eagle Scouts, Venturing Summit Award recipients, and Sea Scout Quartermasters.

The Building Character Celebration opened in the President Ford Division with a gala dinner at the Amway Grand Plaza Hotel in Grand Rapids. The celebration then moved to the east side of the state, where the Great

Lakes Division held a picnic-style event at the Packard Proving Grounds Historic Site in Shelby Township.

For Marines Masunas and Walsh, these appearances reflect the Marine Corps League's mission to foster the ideals of Americanism and patriotic volunteerism, in part by recognizing America's youth who have achieved the highest honors in Scouting. By presenting these certificates at the two dinners, the Marines connected the League's values with the next generation of Scouting's leaders. These appearances continue to strengthen the enduring partnership between the Marine Corps League and Scouting, building lasting goodwill in communities across Michigan and reflecting the League's deep and ongoing commitment to America's youth.

How do we start a program?

The following basic guidelines will assist any Detachment / Department that wishes to participate in our exciting program. This program can be as simple or as elaborate as your membership decides.

- The Detachment / Department votes to participate in the program at any regularly scheduled meeting. There is a cost factor in providing this program, so a vote is necessary from the membership.
- A League or Associate Member will be appointed by the Commandant from the Detachment / Department as the Chair of the Scout Committee. Department Chairs should notify the Division and National Committees of their appointment. Detachment Chairs should contact their Department Chair. This will assist National to maintain accurate contact information throughout the Marine Corps League.
- The Chair, and any committee members, do not need to have been or be currently active in Scouting to participate.
- Semiannual reports of the number of certificates presented should be forwarded to the Department / Division / National Committees. All the report needs is the number of certificates presented. We do not need any additional information at the National level.
- Your first report will show the number of awards presented for the period of July 1 to December 31 is **due by January 15th** for the National Mid Winter Conference. A final report for the National Annual Convention will be the total number of awards given for the total Marine Corps League fiscal year July 1st to June 30th of the following year. This report is **due by July 15th**. No reports are accepted after that.
- The expenses for this program will be the cost of the certificate \$2.00 each, a green presentation folder if wanted \$2.20. If a member is unable to attend the Court of Honor to present the certificate, make sure the certificate is mailed (cost for postage) to the Scout so he or she will be able to display the certificate at his Court of Honor.

Presenting the Certificates?

The following basic guidelines will assist in the presentation of the certificates to the Scout(s). Again, this can be as simple or as elaborate as you are comfortable with.

- Be in a proper Marine Corps League uniform.

Suggestion: it is our time to shine and leave an impression. Uniforms can include the Undress or Casual Uniforms. Some Detachments have polo shirts that they wear with black or tan trousers. If you have more than one presenter, try and be uniform in what is worn.

- Have a Good Citizenship Award for the Scout filled out and ready to be presented.
- Find out when/where you are to present the award, usually they have a person who is running the program that will assist you with this.

Suggestion: Contact the Court of Honor coordinator to make sure that they have the ability to have a representative to present the certificate, sometimes the ceremony is small and they do not actually need a physical presence and simply mailing the certificate is perfectly acceptable.

- Give your remarks.

Suggestion: Try and arrive early, the Scouts will have displays of their Scouting Journey that can help inform your comments. You can have a standard delivery or improvise, it is up to you. A "warrant" was developed based off of our enlisted promotion warrants that can be used as a simple and standard delivery.

- Present the Award(s).

- Take pictures.

Suggestion: Take any pictures before the ceremony begins, because when it is done, everyone will want pictures and this will allow you to leave as soon as the ceremony is completed.
